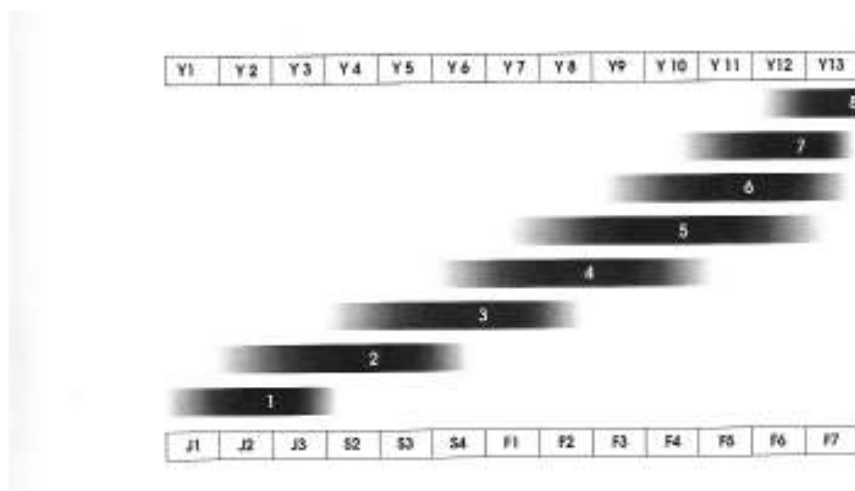


## Levels in our Mid Year Reports

### Curriculum Levels

The achievement levels in this report indicate development related to the New Zealand Curriculum (NZC). The levels shown in our reports are based on an overall teacher judgement. The diagram below comes from the New Zealand Curriculum and shows how the eight levels go across several years of schooling and where your child should be achieving for their age.



Some people have found these levels too big and broad so many assessment tools further divide these levels into three sub levels- Basic (B), Proficient (P) and Advanced (A). Chaucer uses these sub levels in our assessment and reporting.

The level that your child should be achieving at for their age will be shaded in at the top of the report. This needs to be considered as you read your child's report.

### Reading Levels in the juniors – Years 1-3

Reading levels in the juniors are based on the 26 Reading levels of the 'Ready to Read' series of books. These levels are aligned to colours. The National Standards for reading in the juniors are also aligned to these colours and levels.

The National Standard for reading after one year of school is to reach levels 12-14 (Green)																																										
The National Standard for reading after two years of school is to reach levels 17-18 (Turquoise)																																										
The National Standard for reading after three years of school is to reach levels 21-22 (Gold)																																										

### Reading Levels in the seniors

Once a child has passed through the 26 reading levels their reading attainment can be given in years. Running record and other assessment tools (AsTTle) give children a reading age in years. Although children develop at different rates, your child's reading age should be at or above their chronological age.
