REPORTING TO PARENTS

Rationale:

- 1. Both formal and informal reporting is important in the establishing of good relations between parents, child and teacher. These relationships are essential to good learning.
- 2. All reporting should be objective and constructive.
- 3. NAG 2 (c) states that each board must report to parents and students about each student's individual learning and progress and NAG 2 (d) states each board must report to the community as a whole on progress and achievement of students as a whole, and of identified and specifically targeted groups.

Guidelines:

- 1. Regular informal communication between parents and teachers will keep parents informed of what is happening in the school, especially about their child's learning.
- 2. General information will be communicated to whanau in fortnightly school newsletters and notices as required.
- 3. Student led conferences will be held twice a year.
- 4. Written formal reports for every student will be issued to whanau twice a year.
- 5. Reporting will be based on a range of data collected over the course of the year.
- 6. Written formal reports will be adapted to suit Individual Learning Plans of students with special needs.

- 7. Any concerns about the child's well-being, learning and relationships with others will be communicated by the teachers and staff in a timely, respectful and confidential manner.
- 8. All reporting of individual students' learning and progress to their parents will remain confidential to the relevant student and their parents as per the Privacy Act 1993.
